Predict – To say or estimate what you think will happen.

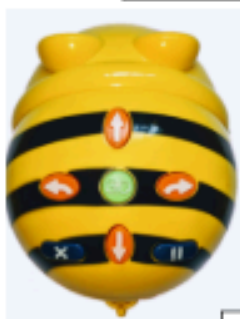
Commands – To give an order or instruction.

contain artwork.

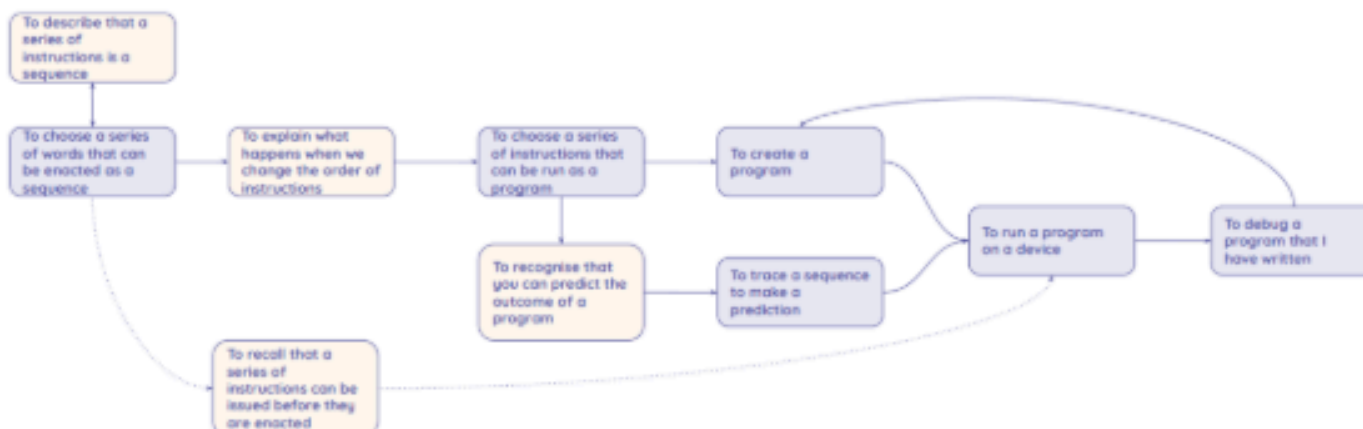


What is a bug?

A bug is a mistake in a program which means it does not do what you expect it to.

hard, smooth.



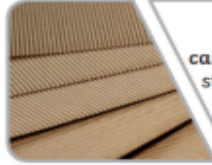
plastic:

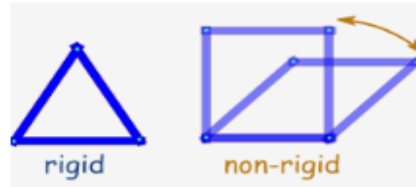

Key Vocabulary

materials	Materials are what objects are made from.
suitability	Suitability means having the properties which are right for a specific purpose.
properties	This is what a material is like and how it behaves (soft, stretchy, waterproof).

Key Vocabulary

Material- what something is made from.

Properties- the features of a material.

Description- how something is described.

Natural- found in nature.

Man-made- made by humans.

Manufactured- produced on a large scale using machines.

Hard- not easily broken or pierced.

Soft- not firm to the touch.

Squashy- easily crushed or squeezed.

Bumpy- uneven, raised patches.

Dull- lacking shine or brightness.

Brittle- hard, but may break easily.

Opaque- cannot be seen through.

Translucent- allowing some light to pass through.

Transparent- can be seen through.

Flexible- able to bend.

Rigid- unable to be bent or forced out of shape.

Rough- uneven, irregular surface.

Smooth- an even and regular surface.

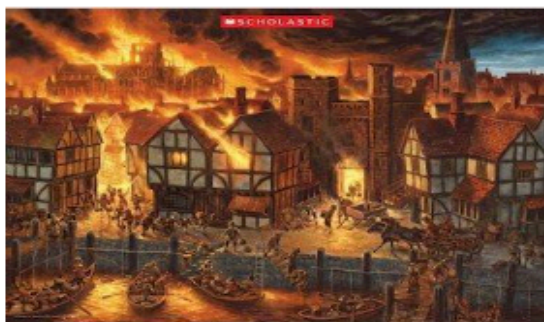
Absorbent- able to soak up liquid.

Waterproof- repels water and liquids.

Elastic- springs back once stretched.

Shiny- reflects light, smooth surface.

Key Vocabulary

Building- A structure with a roof where people can live or work.

Landscape- The features of an area of land that you can see.

1666- A time during the 17th Century.

King Charles II- The monarch (King) who sat on the throne during this time in history.

Samuel Pepys- Worked for Parliament and kept a diary of the fire.

Poor- People who do not have enough money to live on.

Rich- People who have more money than they need to live on.

Fire- A quick, on-going chemical change that releases heat, light and flames.

Newspaper- A publication with written information about current events to tell you what is happening around you.

Portrait- A painting of a person or landscape.

Statement- A clear expression of something in speech or writing.

Diary- A written record of a person's experiences, thoughts, and feelings with dates that sequence events (put them in order).

Spread- Something that extends and moves over a large area.

Water- a substance made of the chemical elements hydrogen and oxygen. It can be gas, liquid, and solid states. We are most familiar with it in a liquid state.

River Thames- A river in London that leads to the sea.

Bakery- A place where bread and pastries are made early in the morning or during the night.

Pudding Lane- the Street in London where the Great Fire of London began in a bakery.

Thomas Farriner- The man who owned the bakery where The Great Fire of London began.

Monday 3rd September 1666
The fire gets very close to the Tower of London.

Tuesday 4th September 1666
St Paul's Cathedral is destroyed by the fire.

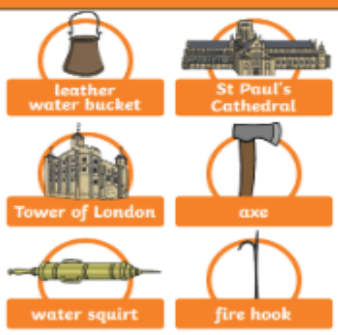
Timeline of Events

Sunday 2nd September 1666
The fire starts at around 1 a.m.
Mid-morning: Samuel Pepys starts to write about the fire in his *diary*.

Wednesday 5th September 1666
The wind dies down and the fire spreads more slowly.

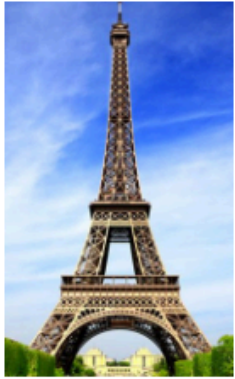
Thursday 6th September 1666
The fire is finally put out.
Thousands of people are left homeless.

Free Standing Structure



Key Vocabulary:

Structure: 3D shape made from different materials and parts.

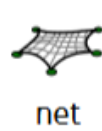
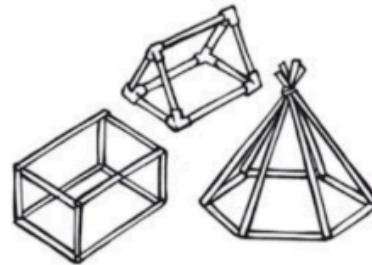
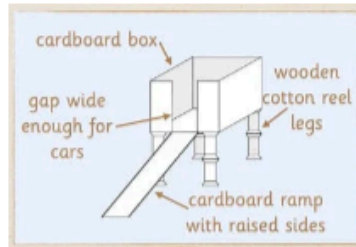
Frame Structure: A frame structure is made of different parts joined together.

Shell Structure: A shell structure has an outer layer and is hollow. Its outside layer is thin and curved.

3D Shape: A solid shape that has length, width and height. It is not flat.

Hollow: Something that is empty inside.

Net: A net is what a 3D shape would look like if it was unfolded.
