Use large-muscle movements to draw lines and circles and make marks. Using scissors and tools safely Start eating independently and learning how to use a knife and fork.	Start taking part in some group or team activities. Use a comfortable grip with good control when holding pens and pencils. Show a preference for a dominant hand.	Increasingly be able to use and remember sequences and patterns of movements which are related to music and rhythm. Be increasingly independent as they get dressed and undressed, for example, putting coats on and doing up zips. Make healthy choices about food, drink, activity and toothbrushing. Understanding the World	Begin to make sense of their own life-story and family's history. Continue developing positive attitudes about the differences between people. Begin to develop complex stories using small world equipment like animal sets, dolls and dolls houses etc. Draw with increasing complexity and detail, such as representing a face with a circle and including details. Listen with increased attention to sounds. Create their own songs or improvise a song around one they know.	Join different materials and explore different textures. Show different emotions in their drawings and paintings, like happiness, sadness, fear etc. Respond to what they have heard, expressing their thoughts and feelings.
